Frederick McKinley Jones


American inventor Frederick McKinley Jones is credited with designing the portable refrigeration unit.

Orphaned at age nine, a Catholic priest in Cincinnati, Ohio raised Jones until he left to explore life on his own. Instead of high school, Jones taught himself mechanical and electrical engineering and began working as a mechanic's helper at garage in Hallock, Minnesota. By age 19, he was shop foreman and well known for building and racing cars. He adapted the silent movie projector to use talking movie stock and developed the ticket dispensing machine for movie box-offices. Jones later sold the dispenser machine patent rights to RCA and obtained his engineering license. Arriving in France during World War I, he electrifed his camp for electricty, telephone and telegraph service and conceived the self-starting gas motor - patenting it in 1943.

One hot summer night, Jones resolved to invent air conditioning for cars and trucks. He created a compact, shockproof, automatic refrigeration unit using his self-starting motor and with a business partner, Jones founded Thermo King. Still in business today, the company marketed his portable refrigeration products to trucks, trains and ships. He modified his unit allowing military field hospitals to store blood during World War II. In 1944, Jones was the first African American elected to the American Society of Refrigeration Engineers and had more than 60 patents during his lifetime. Jones died in 1961, but was awarded the National Medal of Technology posthumously by President George Bush in 1991 – the first African American to receive the recognition.




